Tips for practicing speech & language skills on the road

Need an idea for a New Year's resolution? How about keeping up with practicing speech/language homework! Carryover at home is so important for improvement and mastery of skills. With school homework, sporting events, and hectic lives this can be difficult. Here are a few tips for practicing skills on the go!

- **Articulation:** Keep an articulation book filled with stimulus words in the car to practice on the way to sporting events, or on the way home from school

- **WH- questions:** On the way home from school or practice, ask your child a variety of WH-questions like "what did you do in art class?", "who did you play with at recess?", "where did you eat lunch?" etc.
- **Figurative language:** Describe and interpret the figurative language in lyrics of music.
- **Attribute/describing:** Have the child describe objects seen while driving like in the "I spy" game. Have them talk about function, category, attributes, etc.
- **Sequencing:** Have your child sequence events from the day. Prompt them using first, next, last language (e.g., first I walked down the hall to art class, next I painted a picture of a snowman, last I presented it to the class). It can be as simple as that, or more complex with multiple steps.

What: The “Effective Strategies for Anxiety Related and Oppositional Behavior” will feature Jessica Minahan, author of “The Behavior Code.” Understanding the role anxiety plays in a student’s behavior is crucial and using preventative strategies are key to successful interventions. Effective behavior plans for these students must avoid the reward and punishment-based consequences from traditional behavior plans, and focus instead on the use of preventative strategies, and on explicitly teaching coping skills, self-monitoring and alternative responses.
